The close cooperation between Germany's main libraries is a defining feature of the country's overall library landscape. Here, IFLA-

Express introduces you to the three largest libraries in Germany:

Die Deutsche Bibliothek

Die Deutsche Bibliothek is the central archive library and national bibliographical information centre for the Federal Republic of Germany. It was established in 1990 by the merging of three existing institutions the Deutsche Bücherei Leipzig (founded 1912), the Deutsche Bibliothek Frankfurt am Main (founded 1947) and the Deutsches Musikarchiv Berlin (an integral part of the Deutsche Bibliothek since 1970). It is uniquely responsible for the collection, archiving and documentation of all German and German-language publications issued since 1913. It is also responsible for ensuring unfettered access to holdings and offers a range of national bibliographical services. Entire holdings currently total some 18 million units - of those some 10.2 million are in Leipzig, 7.4 million in Frankfurt and 1 million in Berlin. Die Deutsche Bibliothek maintains close links with all national and international libraries and related institutions, making it a leading partner in the development and application of general regulations and standards for Germany.

Founded in 1661, today's Staatsbibliothek zu Berlin - Preußischer Kulturbesitz acquires texts from all fields of knowledge in all languages, in every available form, from all epochs and all countries of the world - providing the materials are of interest for academic and research purposes. Germany's largest general scholarly library owns 10 million books, 4,400 incunabula, 18,000 occidental manuscripts, 40,000 oriental manuscripts, 250,000 autographs, 66,350 music autographs, 1,400 archives and estates, 450,000 print music editions, 960,000 maps and atlases, 38,000 subscription periodicals and monographic series, 180,000 early bound newspaper volumes

and 400 newspaper subscriptions, various databases, 2.3 million microfiches and microfilms and 13.5 million images in the picture archive.

After World War II the library was divided between two sites in the East and West of Berlin. The two institutions were officially reunited in 1992. Some 1.2 million library transactions are recorded annually (loans, information services etc.). BSB Bayerische StaatsBibliothek

The **Bayerische Staatsbibliothek** is the state library of Bavaria and the second largest general scholarly library in Germanspeaking countries. It owns some 7.8 million volumes, 87,000 occidental, oriental and music manuscripts, among them many priceless pieces, 18,600 incunabula and current subscriptions to 45,000 periodicals and newspapers. The Bayerische Staatsbibliothek was founded in the mid 16th century. The library's holdings were considerably increased after the secularisation of Bavarian monasteries and seminaries in the early 19th century.

After 1663 and the first codification of legal deposit rights for Bavaria, the library received two copies of every publication printed in the state. The library collects publications pertaining to all countries and subjects, with the exception of technology. Areas of special interest include eastern and southeastern Europe, the Middle East and the countries and cultures of East Asia. In 2002, the library spent 11.85 million euros on stock expansion. 42,300 library users ordered and borrowed books, 489,000 people visited the General Reading Room. Situated in Munich's Ludwigstraße, the library was constructed between 1832-43 by Friedrich von Gärtner and is the largest brick

building of its kind in Germany. | For more information:

He is co-editor of the following journals: Journal of Information Science, Nachrichten für Dokumentation, Information Processing & Management, and Library Management. In addition, he is chief editor of the book series "Schriften zur Informationswissenschaft" (currently more than 30 vols.).

Among the many positions that he holds, he is Chairperson of the Board of the Hochschulverband Informationswissenschaft (German Society of Information Science — HI), Member of the German UNESCO Commission, Chairperson of the German UNESCO Committee for Communications, German UNESCO Chair in Communications (ORBICOM), and Director of NETHICS e.V. (Information Ethics in the Net).

□ Notes for Speakers

Speakers should speak slowly and clearly and keep continuously in mind that for a large percentage of their audience, the language of the presentation is a foreign one

Speakers should pay due attention to requests from the interpreters (e.g., to speak more slowly, to speak into the microphone, etc.).

Whenever possible, speakers should not read their papers, but introduce it, highlight the most important points and in this way encourage the audience to discuss the content of the paper. It is much easier to hold the attention of an audience when speaking from notes.


